Advent

December marks the beginning of Advent, the time of preparation that leads us to the coming of Jesus Christ. Advent is a time to prepare

for the birth of Jesus as a baby in Bethlehem and Advent is also a time to prepare our heart, soul, and mind for Christ coming again at the end of the age. We affirm as part of our faith that in the future the kingdom of God will fully come, and Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior will come again as the King of Kings. Right now, at this time in history, through the birth, life, death, and resurrection of our Lord, the Kingdom of God is present on earth. But we are aware that the kingdom has not been fully realized. The Kingdom of God will be fully present in all of its glory when Christ comes again.

Eugene Peterson referred to this time as "living in the middle", the middle between God's creating the world as described in Genesis and when God will re-create the world for the Kingdom of Heaven. In Peterson's book "Reversed Thunder" he writes, "We believe that God is at the beginning of all things and that God is at the conclusion of all life, 'the Alpha and the Omega' (Rev. 1:8). It is assumed that the beginning was good (God saw everything he had made, and it was very good) and it is agreed that the conclusion will be good. That would seem to guarantee that everything between the good beginning and the good ending will also be good. But it doesn't turn out that way. Between the beginning and ending there are disappointments, contradictions, not-tobe explained absurdities, and bewildering paradoxes each of them a reversal of expectation."

Christmas is that Jesus Christ was born into this middle time. Christ came in the middle to meet us in the darkness, and he brings the light of God into the world.

One of the elements of worship during Advent that recognizes the light of God is the Advent Candle lighting. Each Sunday we will light an additional candle that leads up to the Christ candle on Christmas eve. The four candles of Advent are Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. Each candle's light adds to the celebration until Christ's candle, celebrating his birth, recognizes that God's light has fully come through Jesus Christ.

To help you prepare for the celebration of Christ's birth and the future coming of Christ we provide a devotional for Advent. You will find this year's devotional, "The Light of Grace" available on our Greeters table. Please take one. This booklet provides a 5-minute devotional for each day of Advent. The subtitle for the devotional is "Welcoming God's Amazing Gift of Christ." and begins, "Advent is about amazing grace coming in the Son of God, Jesus Christ." The outline for the devotion follows the Advent candles. Christ's light of grace offers us hope, brings peace to the world, makes room for joy, and is grounded in God's love for us. The devotional uses the familiar words from the hymn Amazing Grace to illustrate God's grace born in a manger.

As we enter Advent I encourage you to journey through this season preparing your hearts to receive Christ, to experience God's light and God's amazing grace.

May you have a blessed Advent and a Merry Christmas.

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Christmas Joy Offering:

Helping Leaders - Past, Present, and Future

As Christians celebrating Christmas this year, we remember God's perfect gift of Jesus and stand in wonder and gratitude that God sent his son to save us. As Presbyterians, it is appropriate that we think also about our leaders, past, present, and future, and do what we can to make sure they have our help when needed.

One very powerful way PC (USA) addresses help for leaders is with the Christmas Joy Offering, this year taken officially on December 17. Fifty percent of the money donated will go to helping church leaders, both active and retired, in times of financial need, by providing supplemental income, housing support, or emergency assistance. A great example of a leader receiving this kind of support is Rev. Peggy Krong, who made a mid-life change to ministry and therefore had very limited resources when she retired. Because of gifts from the Christmas Joy Offering, the Presbyterian Board of Pensions was able to pay her initial fee to move into a retirement home and provide her an ongoing housing supplement. She continues her outreach as she can and is enjoying a secure retirement.

The other fifty percent of our Christmas Joy Offering will be directed to help three Presbyterian-related schools and colleges which reach out to people of color. Menaul School in Albuquerque, Presbyterian Pan American School in Kingsville, Texas, and Stillman College in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, welcome students of color and provide the support and encouragement needed for their students to become ministers and other church leaders. Mother-and-daughter pair Carla and Savannah are an inspiring example. Because of family issues, Carla had to postpone her education for many years and ended up being a student at Stillman College when Savannah was also there. They received lots of support, and Savannah said that once she became part of the community, there was no way she could fail. That comment speaks to a success we need to support!

God's Voice on the GPS

Since the season of Thanksgiving is upon us, it behooves me to write this big thank you note to Pastor Bob and church members. I know I have been listed on our prayer list for most of the year, and I so appreciated it when Pastor Bob remembered my need by name in front of the altar. Right when I'd thought I had a problem in hand and could be taken off it, another health issue poped up, and I realized how much I needed your dear communal prayers of concern. My mom would say when you pray about it, "it" will come out smooth as silk.

Allow me to recall how I believe your prayers were heard even beyond my health needs. This summer, while driving through Denver to Colorado Springs for my sister's and husband's 70th Wedding Anniversary, I was taking the outside lane through heavy traffic which is the faster lane. I'd set my cruise control to slow behind a slower car but gain my set speed limit when that car turned away. Thus I needed not to touch a brake or to switch lanes. I usually took the middle slower lane leading through Denver, but I was in a bit of a rush.

I knew I had passed the Toll Road to DIA near Thornton and was in north Denver when I realized my left lane had gradually veered further left, and I was traveling on a trip east, not south. I was befuddled whether to follow this route which could hopefully turn south past DIA or whether to turn off a south exit now. Since I was running on my cruise control and relying on its camera to slow down, I must have looked down, for upon looking up, I was fast approaching a slower car. I laid rubber and my tires squealed as I waited for impact; however, that car sped up and swept into his left lane, avoiding the collision. He was like a fly spinning sideways from my swatter.

My decision was made, and I shakily took the first right exit to find a turn-off to call family. I didn't want to turn on a right street with the confusion of returning to the busy four-lane road, so I was happy to see a graveled turn-off to catch my breath. With trash gathered on the streets, I knew I was lost in Aurora somewhere <u>AND</u> that I was so alone. I also knew I had to rely on using my car's GPS but was uncertain I could program it, as well as concerned whether I could hear the directions or even look down enough to see them on the screen while driving.

When I punched in my sister's home address, the computer read "No Match." My heart sunk. Then I punched in "Colorado Springs" with hope the direction would lead me back to I-25. When the map came up, the street I didn't take just ahead of my turn-off was Apache, the same as my home street in Cheyenne! I first thought the GPS was confused, thinking my car was in my garage in Cheyenne. Then I realized <u>that</u> Apache was diagonal and <u>my</u> Apache perpendicular. Didn't take long to know I was following <u>God's</u> direction with <u>His</u> message that I was "home safe."

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With my shakiness abated, I dared to get back on the four-lane busy road again and soon passed a sign on a trailer park called Wickiup. I knew that was an Indian word for a teepee of refuge, and memories of my sisters and mother, while taking a "bonding trip" by staying overnight at rustic cabins in Spearfish Canyon called Wickiup, flooded my fears with a smoothing, silky calm. I literally spoke aloud to God, thanking him for the obvious answer to my prayers for safety on the road, but also I felt the cover of refuge streaming from those many prayers for me that you all had sent up to God's ears.

Surely God had heard my grateful thanks for He gave me a <u>third</u> direction of comfort. I distinctly heard His GPS voice say I was to take the next right turn. That street was so aptly named for me: "Rosemary."


