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Upcoming Exciting Events

As we enter the summer months, there are some exciting events in ministry on the calendar.

Vacation Bible School (VBS) is always an energetic and fun week at

First Presbyterian Church. This year, VBS will be from June 19-22, and the theme is "Babylon, Daniel's Courage in Captivity." Daniel was a Israelite living in Babylon during the exile. One of the most well-known events in the book of Daniel was when the King punished Daniel by throwing him into a lion's den. Daniel was being punished for praying to God in disobedience to the King's decree. But Daniel had courage because of his faith in God. The God that had rescued the Israelites from Egypt would rescue him from the lion's den. When Daniel survived his night in the lion's den, he had this conversation with the King. The King said, "O Daniel, servant of the living God, has your God whom you faithfully serve been able to deliver you from the lions?" and Daniel replied, "O King, my God sent his angel and shut the lions' mouths so that they would not hurt me, because I was found blameless before him." Our kids will face many challenges to their faith in the world and Daniel is a great model of faith and courage.

You can do two things to help with Vacation Bible School, pray and volunteer. I ask all of you to keep the staff, volunteers, and kids in prayer during VBS. Pray that they hear and receive the word of God during the week. Keep the staff and volunteers in prayer for energy and guidance as they minister to the children in Christ's name. First Presbyterian is Recognized

The local Historic Preservation Board and the City of Cheyenne presented the LeClercq Jones award for historic preservation to our church on Saturday, May 6.

The Historic Preservation Board recognized the work the church did during the renovation to preserve the looks of the original building while adding to the building in a way that complimented the original structure. Using limestone from the original quarry in Indiana, some of the design elements of the original building were also incorporated into the new addition stonework. In making the selection, the Historic Preservation Board looks for exceptional historic preservation efforts through restoration and or maintenance of the structure.

The church worked with The Design Studio, Inc., on the project and is pleased with the design of the new addition. Architect Amber Conwell, working with the Capital Building Committee, used input from the congregation on a design that compliments the existing building. The new façade and entrance does that well. The church is honored to receive the LeClercq Jones award honoring its efforts during the renovation project.

"The Holy Land Revealed" is a DVD series by Jodi Magness, who taught the recent Adult Sunday School Class DVD program. She covers history and architecture of the Holy Land from the time the Israelites first entered Canaan

to the Muslims taking over Jerusalem. Now on the shelves is the series the class just finished, "Jesus and His Jewish Influences," also by Jodi Magness.

"Traveling Light," by Max Lucado, uses the lines of the 23rd Psalm to show the reader how to remove such burdens as grief, guilt, worry, anger, loneliness, fear, and doubt so we can travel through life "lighter." "Traveling light means trusting God with the burdens you were never intended to bear." It allows us to better serve others and preserve relationships with others and with God without negative impacts.



Therese Alberta Parkinson Jenkins

Therese Alberta Parkinson was born in 1853 in Madison, Wisconsin. In 1877, she came to Cheyenne to marry James F. Jenkins on December 20. He was employed as Chief Clerk of the Commissary Dept. at Camp Carlin and unable to return to Wisconsin due to Indian uprisings. In those days it would have taken two weeks to go to Wisconsin and return.

Cheyenne was known as "Hell on Wheels" due to the lawlessness, the number of saloons and dance halls (which outnumbered the businesses). She became interested in civic welfare, education, and social environment for the women and children and became an ardent worker for Woman's Suffrage.

Wyoming Territory had given Women the right to vote on December 10, 1869, by the first session of the Wyoming Territorial Legislature. Women were given the right to hold public office and to sit on juries in this act. This is what truly gave Wyoming the right to claim, "The Equality State."

She helped organize and fund a reading room and helped organize the Relief Society. She became a member of the First Presbyterian Church in 1880.

In September of 1889 the Constitutional Convention was called to adopt a constitution under the Enabling Act. Rumor was that Congress would not accept Wyoming's constitution with the Women's Vote and Hold Office in it causing women to lose this right. On the morning of September 25th, there was a resolution introduced to take that clause out of the drafted constitution. Knowing how much both James and Therese were interested in suffrage, a delegate from Laramie let James know so he could go home and let Therese know. James hitched up the horse and buggy and she went around Cheyenne letting all women know and telling them to get down to the meeting and use their influence to not let that happen. The man who had introduced the resolution withdrew it as he didn't want to face the wrath of all those women. Therese didn't go to the meeting as she had gone into labor and went home to deliver a baby girl whom she named Agnes Wyoming Jenkins.

Because of her work to save Woman's Suffrage for

the State of Wyoming, she was asked to give the keynote address the following July at the big celebration. In order to be heard for the four-block area surrounding the capitol where the celebration was held, she had practiced by going to the outskirts of town with her husband and baby. He would proceed to move further and further away from where she was - giving her signals as to when she could be heard and understood so that her enunciation and everything was correct.

Her address was copied in innumerable Woman Suffrage papers and in Temperance magazines and was even translated into many foreign languages. She had a copy printed in the French language in one of the French newspapers of the day.



at noon on May 5. All women were invited. Rebecca Circle hosted and provided lovely flowers as decorations. Each table had packets of wildflower seeds native to Wyoming for each woman to take home and plant.

She is the Victims Advocate for the Cheyenne Police department. She gave a very informative speech on what is needed to help women, men, and children in need and where they can seek help. Kay Barnes presented the by-laws, and as there were no questions, the vote passed for approval.

A big thank you goes out to the women who donated three big tubs of items for Safehouse at the Presbyterian Women's Luncheon in May! Your generosity is greatly appreciated. Many of their clients and children come away from a violent situation with nothing but the clothes on their backs. The big blue bin in the narthex of the church is available year-round for donations of items such as personal hygiene products--shampoo, deodorant, body wash; feminine hygiene products; nail clippers; combs and brushes; twin bed linens, towels, and dryer sheets. At Christmas, we will have a separate gathering of slippers, jewelry, scarves, candles, decorations, and other items the children can give their mothers as a gift. Born in Rawlins, Ruth has also lived most of her life in Cheyenne and formerly worked for Laramie County. The Waterfield's have three sons and four grandchildren. Both list our minister as a reason for joining.


Your contributions took many forms: Maybe you contributed to the Super Bowl drive the youth held after church, dropped off food or underwear donations at church, mailed a check to Day of Giving, volunteered at the event itself, contributed to any of several pre-event collections . . . We appreciate every kind of support, and it all comes together to prove our motto, the Helen Keller quote, "Together we can do so much."

As of the deadline for this newsletter, we have the 10th Annual Youth Event and the 18th Annual Day of Giving in the books – barely. At this point, we know you and other generous donors joined our efforts and dropped off almost 13 tons of food and personal care items, 256 pounds of prescription medications, almost 1600 pounds of medical supplies, and over \$8200 in donations at the event itself, just to give a few examples. In reference to our new way to give - bringing out housewares and gently used furniture to help the Habitat for Humanity Fresh Start Program, we were amazed to receive 70 boxes of housewares and 15 pieces of furniture (with additional furniture dropped off that day at the ReStore). Clearly, the rainy, windy Wyoming weather did not dampen the generosity of donors who saw the huge need in our area and came out to give as they were able!


